

Life as a child for Florence was busy doing domestic tasks: sewing and cleaning both at home and at their local church, St. Andrews. At the very early age of six, Florence was taught to make her own clothes, quilt, mend, woodwork, and to install flooring just to name a few of her skills. Florence was known as the best dressed girl in school. Custom designs and one-of-a-kind items helped her earn that title.

Florence attended Franklin School through middle school and then graduated from Central High (South High School). She worked hard at school just like she did at home. She consistently brought home grade cards with straight A's and found her name on the honor roll. Because she was so bright and talented, she held several different jobs throughout her lifetime. She worked at Wigwam Mills, WKTS radio as the administrative secretary, Ross Glove Company, and finally Elvers Brothers Paint Store where she served as bookkeeper and CPA. Each and every talent she possessed were self-taught. She was a quick learner and a born leader.

The Masquerade Balls on Saturday nights were the hot spots for Florence and her girlfriends. Florence lights up with pride as she recalls the Saturday ballroom dances at Eagles Hall or 99 Hall. This classy group of friends would make elaborate gowns or dresses, rehearse their routines around her mother's dining room table and take a first or second place prize each and every week. Not to mention, that was when she was just 14-15 years old. So if Tom Bergeron from *Dancing with the Stars* should call, transfer it to Florence ext. 205.

There were no boys involved in her life during her dancing days, but at the age of 21 that quickly changed. Florence met her husband George when he came to Kohler during a labor strike, as he was working for the Calvary or "National Guard" unit. The day Florence brought George for dinner; it was love at first sight! (Well, her mom loved George immediately). She told Florence this was the man she would marry. George was very impressed by her mom's cooking, so he figured if she is a great cook, Florence surely would be too. The engagement was set. George worked many years for the Streetcar Company and then opened a Shell Oil filling station for a few years. They had two sons, Warner and Lane. The boys would change oil or wash windows at the filling station to help out.
